"The Thai Government introduced a ban on electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes or 'vaping'), shisha smoking, and electronic shishas in 2014, for "health reasons and to discourage young people from starting to smoke". The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) is reminding visitors to the country about this ban, which is part of the Tobacco Control Law, and the law prohibiting smoking in public areas."

However, according to a health directive announced in the Royal Gazette on June 14, anyone smoking cannabis and hemp in public for recreational purposes shall face imprisonment of up to three months or a fine of up to 25,000 baht if they cause a public nuisance or pose health hazards to others."

SAFETY MESSAGE

MOTORCYCLE SAFETY MONTH

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has declared 1-31 May as Motorcycle Safety Month. According to an article, today, in the Bangkok Post, "Thailand's roads are death traps." The article states that Thai roads are some of the deadliest in this region and among the 10 most dangerous in the world. According to the Department of Disease Control, motorcycles attribute to 74% of the traffic fatalities on the roads. Of the 20,000 people killed on roads each year, 15,000 of them are motorcyclists. That is three out of four fatalities.

So, how can you protect yourself and others? Most importantly, if you are riding a motorcycle, wear a helmet and ride

defensively. While you may be obeying all the traffic laws, you can rest assured the typical Thai motorcyclist is not.

HERE ARE SOME MORE TIPS TO HELP KEEP YOU SAFE

- 1. Wear your helmet! This one step could potentially save many of the lives lost in accidents.
- 2. When traffic lights turn green, watch right AND left first!
- 3. Safety distance doesn't exist in Thailand: if there is room for a car, truck, or motorcycle to move over, rest assured they will.
- 4. Beware of 'Ghost Riders' and other weird things! Ghost riders are incredibly common

here. In case you don't yet know what a ghost rider is, it is a bike driving on the wrong side of



the road, because it's a lot faster for them to reach home than going all the way to the next U-Turn.

5. Always assume the guy coming at

the intersection didn't see you. If the other guy

has a stop sign, always assume they're not going to stop. Nine times out of ten, they won't stop.

- 6. Don't underestimate how much you drank. Alcohol and motorcycles don't mix. Don't drink and drive.
- 7. Keep your eyes on the cars, trucks, and bikes in front of you at all times. Too many fatal accidents occur when bike riders fail to notice they brake hard in

front of them.

- 8. Watch out for potholes and sand spots in the road. The condition of the back roads of Thailand can vary from not-so-good to disastrous. Potholes are frequent, and construction sites are rarely indicated. They're common in Thailand and many of them are not marked.
- 9. Emergency Phone Numbers: Have a list of emergency numbers with you or on your bike. CALL 1155, the tourist police number, and call an ambulance if necessary. FOR AN AMBULANCE, CALL 1554. You might hear all kinds of stories, but you will stand a much better chance with an English-speaking police officer, even if just a little.

It was originally called Decoration Day, and it only honored Civil War soldiers. It evolved to what is known as Memorial Day, following World War I, when it took on a greater meaning for all

fallen U.S. service members. In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a national holiday through an act of Congress, and it was moved to the last Monday in May.

While we honor these brave men and women, don't forget the others that returned from wars with both physical and mental injuries.

So, while getting ready to attack that hamburger or hot dog, take a minute of silence to remember those that have fallen for not only protecting our freedom but those of other countries as well.

HISTORY ARTICLE

ASIAN PACIFIC AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH (APAHM)

The month of May celebrates Americans from the Asian Continent along with the Pacific Islands of Melanesia, Micronesia, and Polynesia.

The person responsible for getting APAHM established was Jennie Jew, a staffer on Capitol Hill. She shared her idea with Representative Frank Horton who, in 1977, introduced the legislation that formed it. Senator Daniel Inouye introduced similar legislation in the Senate. It started out as a week-long celebration but, in 1990, it was extended to a month-long celebration.

Jennie Jew's great-grandfather was a Chinese immigrant that came to America in the 1800s. He, along with thousands of other immigrants, worked on the Transcontinental Railroad. He became a successful businessman in California and later moved to Oregon where he was killed by members of an anti-Asian hate group. Jennie wanted to make something positive from her family tragedy by getting recognition for all of the accomplishments that the Asian Community has given this our country. 15,000-20,000 Chinese immigrants helped build the railroad. It took this many because most white men didn't want to do this type of labor. So, you would think pay and benefits would be really good for them, but that was not the case. They were paid less than the white men that did work, plus they got to work longer hours and had to pay for their own food.

OTHER CONTRIBUTIONS FROM ASIAN AMERICANS

Chien-Shiung, Ph.D., a Chinese American who worked on the Manhattan Project, improving on existing technology for the detection of radiation and enrichment of uranium in large quantities.

Larry Itliong, a Filipino-American formed the Filipino Farm Labor Union which later joined Cesar Chavez's National Farm Workers Association which became the United Farm Workers Union.

Ajay Bhatt, an Indian American who developed several technologies for computers, including the USB port.

Katherine Luzuriaga, M.D., a Filipino-American developed early diagnostic tests for detecting HIV in children.

Jawed Karim, a Bangladeshi German American who was a member of the team that gave us YouTube.

Yuri Kochiyama, a Japanese American who spent two years in a detention center during WWII. She became involved with Civil Rights, not only helping Asians but the Black, Latino and Hispanic, and Indigenous peoples communities. She campaigned for, and won, a formal apology and reparations from the U.S. government when President Ronald Reagan signed the Civil Liberties Act into law.

Amanda Nguyen, the daughter of Vietnamese refugees, is a survivor of sexual assault. When she tried to get information on her rights, she found no legislation covering sexual assaults. She went ahead and wrote her own which became the Sexual Assault Survivors Rights Act of 2016. She was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2019.

These are just a few of the many contributions made by Asian Americans. Our country has benefited greatly from them. Even though they haven't been fairly treated, they rose above that.

For those members that might not know what the Tawanchai Foundation is all about, Tawanchai operates under a Royal grant to provide treatment and care to children born with a cleft palate, cleft lip, or other cranial deformities of the head and face. All treatment is free of charge. I have been to

the clinic and seen the work they do, and it is amazing. If you have ever seen a child born with a cleft lip or palate, it simply tears you up. The doctors that perform the surgery are truly gifted, and the staff that supports the foundation is very dedicated.

I highly encourage you to consider donating. SERVICE OFFICER'S MESSAGE

Greetings Comrades,

FBU Manila is encouraging the use of their Inquiry Form on their website as opposed to emailing requests to them. I have sent many emails to them in the past and can attest to the speed and efficiency of this new web-based inquiry link. If you have to contact them, this link is the easiest way to get a quick response:

https://ph.usembassy.gov/services/fbu-inquiry-form/.

Social Security payments to a Thai bank are restricted accounts and make it difficult for your spouse or partner to access this money in the case of your incapacitation. If you are a military retiree, you can offset this by having DFAS send an allotment to your Thai bank. The money will be deducted from your military pay and sent directly to your Thai bank on the same day as your military pay is sent. You eliminate the wire transfer fees and get the normal exchange rate from the receiving bank.

Be prepared. It's the motto of the Boy Scouts and sage advice to everyone at every age. As we get older, our responsibilities grow, and we need to be prepared for many more situations than when we were young. Have your will and powers of attorney designated. Fill out the document "What My Family Should Know" from 1 of the following links and safeguard it with a person you trust. Register yourself in the "Smart Traveler Enrollment Program (STEP), A Service of the Bureau of Consular Affairs, US State Department" from 1 of the following links and designate your next of kin as well as an executor to your estate. The US Embassy is a critical

player in the process of notifying your family of your death, incapacitation, or incarceration. STEP is the first place they look to get information in which to assist you. Make it easier to help you and your family.
